Summer sorting: what to do with your waste

anaging waste effectively is key to keeping our environment clean and green. Based on the bins provided in your community, here's a simple guide to help you sort your waste this summer:







Recycling Bin

- Paper Products: Newspapers, magazines, office paper, cardboard boxes (flatten them if possible)
- Plastic Containers: Bottles, jugs and tubs
- **Glass Containers:** Bottles and jars
- Metal Cans: Aluminum and steel cans

Organics Bin

- Food Scraps: Fruits, vegetables, meat, bread, rice, dairy, coffee grounds, tea bags, eggshells, nutshells.
- Food Soiled Paper: Napkins, paper towels, pizza boxes, non-wax coated paper plates
- Yard Waste: Leaves, grass clippings, small branches, plant trimmings

Trash Bin

- Non-Recyclable Plastics: Plastic bags, wrappers, styrofoam, and any plastic items not labeled for recycling
- Non-Recyclable Paper: Wax-coated paper cups and plates
- Non-Recyclable Metals: Broken or small metal items, like utensils and small hardware
- Select Sanitary Waste Items: Diapers, feminine hygiene products, pet waste



Empty, clean and dry containers: Before recycling, rinse containers, like plastic bottles and metal cans, to remove any remaining food or liquid



Avoid contamination: Avoid placing items in the incorrect bins, as this can prevent waste from being properly recycled or composted



Educate others: Share these sorting guidelines with your family to encourage best waste management practices and emphasize the importance of recycling

Remember, each small effort counts toward creating a more sustainable and healthier environment for everyone.

Keep our streets clean!

elp keep our streets clean and free of debris! Please do not rake, wash, or blow leaves or trash into the street. Place trash into the appropriate container for proper disposal. Sweepers are not able to pick up large piles of leaves or trash as it clogs the vacuum tubes of the machine. Please move or park your vehicle in your driveway on street sweeping day. Containers for Collection

Pepublic Services passes through neighborhoods and apartment communities between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. collecting waste. If Republic Services misses any containers, we encourage you to call (714) 238-2444 to report the missed pickup and schedule the collection. Thank you for doing your part to help keep Anaheim clean!

Construction & Demolition recycling requirements

The state requires all Construction and Demolition projects to recycle or salvage for reuse a minimum of 65 percent of the nonhazardous waste.

Republic Services can provide construction and demolition waste bins in a variety of sizes, which will meet the state's recycling compliance.

atteries and other ignitable materials can start fires inside containers, collection trucks, and waste facilities.

Lithium-ion batteries, which are found in many rechargeable devices, like cell phones, laptops and headphones, are the most common cause of fires. These items should not be thrown away in the trash.

Instead, recycle batteries at the county's Household Hazardous Waste Collection Center at 1071 N. Blue Gum St. or find a local retail center near you at Call2Recycle.org.

Lithium-ion batteries can easily ignite when damaged, and in the process of collecting and processing trash, they are likely to be mangled. Mechanized trucks typically crush waste when picking it up. At material recovery facilities, items travel across conveyors and tumble through a series of sorting machines. At landfills, waste is compacted by heavy equipment. The fires sparked by lithium-ion batteries not only cause damage to vehicles or facilities, but can also result in injuries and service disruptions in the community.

In addition to posing fire hazards, when we trash our portable devices and their batteries, we cannot reuse the beneficial and often rare materials they contain in new products.

We can all do our part to ensure we properly dispose of these batteries to keep our community safe.



Help us prevent **HOT** loads!

Allow hot ashes and charcoal to burn out completely and cool for at least 48 hours before disposing of them. Wrap the ashes in heavy-duty aluminum foil and place into your trash container.



Free mulch and compost

ttention Anaheim residents! Are you looking for compost or mulch in Orange County for use around your home?

Compost and mulch are available from Bee Canyon Greenery at Frank R. Bowerman Landfill in Irvine and Capistrano Greenery at Prima Deshecha Landfill in San Juan Capistrano. OC Waste & Recycling is accepting requests for compost or mulch from Orange County residents, commercial businesses, local cities and government agencies. Take it from 82-year-old Anaheim resident, Jerry Dankner, who's been making his own compost for years using lawn clippings, leaves, twigs, food scraps and red worms.

His journey began when he attended one of Anaheim's Annual Compost Giveaways, where he received free compost and purchased two compost bins. Those bins have come in handy for nourishing his backyard garden.

With limited space, Dankner uses raised beds to grow celery, arugula and sweet potatoes, with more crops on the way.

His favorite food to grow? Simply anything that grows plentifully, such as bell peppers and chilies.

Bye-Bye bulky items!

If you're making plans this summer to part ways with large items, such as couches, old appliances or electronics, we can help haul it away for you.

The city of Anaheim provides residents with a free bulky item pickup service. Your household may dispose of up to 20 items, three times a year.

Follow these steps to schedule your next pick up:

- Make a list of items that you have for pickup, such as furniture, stoves, water heaters, refrigerators or tables
- 2 Call Republic Services Customer Service at (714) 238-2444 to schedule an appointment
- Place items out for pickup by no later than 7 a.m. on the scheduled collection day
- Do not place bulky items inside the trash bin

Used Oil Collection Centers: The City of Anaheim has 31 certified used oil collection centers that will accept your used motor oil and filters for **FREE** recycling. Call (714) 765-4154 for a location near you.

DIY Oil Change Kit: Anaheim Fire & Rescue has an oil change kit that will help you get started with your DIY car project. Each DIY oil change kit includes a 15 quart used oil container, five shop rags and a used oil recycling information card.

No fats, oils or grease down the drain!

is the acronym for **F**ats, cooking **O**ils and **G**rease. If FOG goes down the drain and into sewers, it congeals, coating the inside of pipes and leading to blockages and sewer backups.

Follow these easy steps to properly dispose of FOG:

- Never put fats, oils or grease down the drain.
- Never put fats, oils or grease in organic cart or bin.
- Never put liquid FOG into any of your carts or dumpsters.
- Dispose of FOG by mixing small quantities of FOG with absorbent materials, such as paper towels, kitty litter, coffee grounds or shredded paper. Then bag it in a plastic bag and put it into your trash cart or dumpster. With larger quantities, such as liquid cooking oil from a turkey fryer, place it into a sealed container (5 gallons or less in size) and deliver it to one of Orange County's Household Hazardous

Waste Collection Centers. These centers will accept a maximum of 15 gallons of cooking oil per resident per visit.
